Marketing Manager

Immigration Officer






Immigration Officers check visitors to the UK are allowed to enter and entitled to stay. They watch people and check documents and visas in passport control areas and interview people to check they are entitled to stay. They will also organise places in holding centres, for example people claiming asylum. They monitor people and gather information through surveillance work. They also work on joint operations with police and Border Force officials and visit and interview people who are suspected of not having the right to remain in the UK. Duties also include collecting statistics and writing reports. This job could be carried out at an airport, at a border post or at a port.

With experience you could then go on the become a senior immigration officer or a manager in the Civil Service.

Court Interpreter





A Courtroom Interpreter makes communication possible in the courtroom. Thanks to their special skills, courtroom interpreters help all people involved to understand the proceedings, regardless of the language they speak. They must translate every word they hear accurately, whenever the judge, solicitors or witnesses are speaking. Courtroom Interpreters must listen to what is said and pass on the information from and into the target language, without adding or removing any word that can change the meaning of the speech.

There are other types of interpreting includes simultaneous interpreting which consists of explaining in real time, whilst people are speaking. Consecutive Interpreting where the Interpreter translates one paragraph at a time.

Virtual Remote Interpreting using the latest technology via phone or video.

Cabin Crew





Airline Cabin Crew are responsible for the comfort, safety and welfare of passengers travelling on aircrafts during short-haul and long-haul flights.

Duties include greeting passengers as they board and exit the plane, showing passengers to their seats and providing special attention to certain passengers, including the elderly or disabled. Other duties include checking the condition and provision of emergency equipment and information for passengers, demonstrating emergency equipment and safety procedures, selling duty-free commercial goods and pursuing sales targets.

Cabin Crew staff enjoy the chance to interact with a wide range of people and the opportunities to explore and enjoy global destinations are almost unparalleled.

Translator





Translators convert written materials from one language into another language. The goal of the Translator is to have people read the translation as if it were the original written material. To do that, the Translator must be able to write sentences that flow as well as the original, while keeping ideas and facts from the original source accurate. They must consider cultural references, including slang, and other expressions that do not translate literally.

Although Translators usually need a degree, the most important requirement is that they be fluent in English and at least one other language. They usually only translate into their native language. Nearly all translation work is done on a computer, and Translators receive and submit most assignments electronically, which makes this an ideal career for working from home and most Translators are self-employed.

Teacher of Spanish





A Spanish Teacher is a professional who teaches students and other people interested in learning the Spanish language on how to properly speak, ready and write in the Spanish language. They may work in Spanish-speaking countries to teach Spanish as a primary language, or in areas that speak other primary languages other than Spanish and teach it as a foreign language.

Typical duties include communicating with other teachers and parents about the progress of students. Creative engaging lesson plans and preparing visual aids that make learning both effective and fun to the students. Grading students' essays, tests, reports and other written assignments and working closely with students to improve their classroom performance.
