



# Author Visit

On Wednesday 24 November, our KS4 students were visited by the globally recognised author, Bali Rai. Known for titles including 'Now or Never: A Dunkirk Story' (which our Year 7 students will study in the new year), Mohinder's War, The Crew, Stay A Little Longer and The Harder They Fall, Bali has secured his place amongst Britain's elite authors writing fiction for teenage audiences today. Students were treated not only to readings from Bali's top titles, but also had a workshop from 'The empathy Lab' (for which he is an Ambassador) on what it is to be human, and have empathy for others, in our 21st Century world. Some lucky 'golden ticket' winners were also fortunate enough to be invited to a 'meet & greet' event with Bali over lunchtime, where they were able to ask questions about his career, as well as gaining some tips for their own writing projects.

We look forward to welcoming Bali back in the Spring term to work with our KS3 students, where he will deliver an 'author workshop' to Year 7 on the book they have studied, and a creative writing workshop to Year 8. When he returns in March, we are also pleased to announce that lunchtime will see a full 'book signing' event, where students can purchase copies of Bali's novels, and get them signed with a personalised message. # Departments in Focus English

Student voice was completed in English during the Autumn term to get feedback from the students on a number of areas including their progress, teaching and learning and also behaviour and attitudes in the department. The results were overwhelmingly positive with a sample of nearly 800 student responses.

### **Key findings**

Over 97% of students responded to say that their teacher in English has 'high expectations of the work they produce and of their behaviour.'

Another area that students identified as being a positive experience in their English lessons is the scaffold and support they receive if they are struggling. With nearly 98% stating that their teacher scaffolds their learning if they don't understand.

Each lesson at Hungerhill allows students to work independently to apply the knowledge from the lesson, over 98% of students identified that this happens in every English lesson for at least 10 minutes.



# Year 10 Intertrain Visit

On Friday 3 December, a group of our year 10 students attended a full day's careers trip at Intertrain, Doncaster. Intertrain are the UK's largest commercialrailway infrastructure training provider who train over 22,000 learners and more than 40 apprentices nationwide every year. Students learnt about operational safety, protection procedures and equipment, engineering measurement and had the opportunity to go on a replica rail track and practice using operational tools. They also had a Q&A session with a successful female rail apprentice, other rail employees and Philippa Barraclough, Head of Education and Business Engagement at Doncaster Chamber.

During Autumn Term, our students have taken part in two drop down days:




- Year 7 RE drop down day on Tuesday 21st November with a focus on prejudice and discrimination, whilst exploring Islam, Christianity and Judaism.
- Year 9 PSHE drop down morning was delivered by an external specialist on Wednesday 17th November with a focus on the relationships side of the Relationships and Sex Education (RSE), including healthy relationships; sexting; keeping safe and consent; CSE and grooming.

Both days were very successful with students conducting themselves excellently and role modelling our core values of care and respect. Feedback from student voice for both days has been very positive, with the large majority of students stating they really enjoyed the day and their understanding had improved considerably.
