Introducing the Hungerhill Study Skills Programme!

Over the last year the school has undertaken a project to explore a number of highly effective strategies to enhance learning, embed knowledge and

aid preparation for assessments. This has been developed into the Hungerhill Study Skills Programme. All students have a Study Skills booklet which includes information on retrieval of knowledge, learning techniques, command words, our five key revision strategies, organisation, revision timetables and wellbeing.

All students have received an introductory assembly on the Study Skills Programme, followed by weekly formtime activities to explore the booklet and each strategy in depth. In support of this, departments across the school will be introducing students to examples of how each strategy can be used in their subject area, as well as encouraging students to create their own versions.

The first strategy in focus is mind maps which will be set as part of lessons or home learning for all subjects and all year groups over the weeks commencing 7th February and 21st February.

Parents and students can find more resources in students' year group Teams (Files – Study skills) and also on the website (Curriculum – Study Skills and Retrieval). These will be updated with videos and further information as our 5 key revision/retrieval strategies are rolled out over Spring Term. A copy of the booklet can be found on the school website (Curriculum-Study Skills and Retrieval).

Careers Employability Skills and Entitlement



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During the first week back after the Christmas holidays, all students attended an assembly that outlined the careers

provision at Hungerhill School. In particular, students heard about the exciting events that have been planned for this year.

As part of the Careers launch, students learnt how teachers will be using our 5 key employability skills in lessons within their subject areas. These employability skills are on display in our newly designed posters in school.

Throughout a students' time at Hungerhill, students will take part in whole year group career experiences as part of their careers provision. These will be delivered as drop-down days, assemblies, and external visits.

The entitlement will be supplemented by various other events such as university and further education visits, World of Work Wednesdays and careers clinics. Along with the support of our Careers Officers and our well resources careers library (pictured), our students will be equipped for their post-16 pathways and beyond.

Department in focus Geography and History

Student voice was completed in History and Geography during the Autumn term to get feedback from the students on a number of areas including their progress, teaching and learning and also the behaviour and attitudes in the department. The results were overwhelmingly positive with a sample of nearly 800 student responses.

Key findings

Over 97% of students responded to say that their teacher in geography has 'high expectations of the work they produce and of their behaviour.

Another area that students identified as being a positive experience in their geography and history lessons is the scaffold and support they receive if they are struggling. With 97% stating that their teacher scaffolds their learning if they don't understand.

Each lesson at Hungerhill allows students to work independently to apply the knowledge from the lesson, over 98% of students identified that this happens in every geography and history lesson for at least 10 minutes.

'Do now' activities are used to review learning from previous lessons to connect to the current learning. In history over 98% of lessons begin with a 'Do now' activity.

A Visit from Rosie Winterton

On Friday 21 January, Rosie Winterton came to Hungerhill to meet with our Student Council. Students had an insight into the life of a Member of Parliament and had the opportunity to ask Rosie their own questions. The 72 students from the School Council who experienced this were incredibly lucky to get such an in-depth insight into the role of an MP. Mrs Pond comments

Enrichment Club in Focus-Gardening Club

This half term, students have been building raised beds and planting fruit trees, including plum quince and apple. The week will be supported by external agencies; the school nurse will be running a drop in for students which will be encouraging them to utilise strategies that support their own healthy wellbeing. MIND Charity are also supporting the week and are in to share their positive strategies for students.

Students are invited to wear a splash of yellow and trainers on Friday 11 February. All funds donated will be utilised by our School Council to buy something for our students to support their mental health. More news to follow!

As you are aware we follow the guidance set to us from the DfE and appreciate the need for transparency.

Rewarding attendance continues to be an exciting bonus of coming to school! Every week a member of the form with 100% attendance for the previous week is invited to breakfast with the Senior Leadership Team. It has been our absolute pleasure to sit and listen to many of our students exciting learning opportunities.

The start of next term will celebrate with the students who have attended over 97% of the time for the last half term (Covid absence continues to be excluded for these figures.) There will also be an invite for the most improved attendee from a form to ensure that we involve as many students as we possibly can. These students will be invited into the exams hall which will be converted into a bowling alley, crazy golf and other inflatable fun activities for the students to engage in some fun.

The form representatives are currently in discussions with their forms about the next attendance event they would like to see in school - we have had many suggestions from helicopter rides to movie events! The students are enthusiastic and motivated to drive these rewards, and it has been my pleasure to guide them gently. The next event will run attendance figures up to the Easter holidays, students who have the most improved will be invited into the events as well as those who maintain their 97% and above attendance. The boys Doncaster Football Competition starts after half term with fixtures coming thick and fast. Another phase in our return to normality. Bring it on!


Netball
