## Key Stage 3 Design and Technology

Over the last term, we have been carrying out the selection process for our Year 10 cohort to form our new Year 11 Student Leader team. Students were nominated by staff then delivered presentations to a staff panel. The presentations were outstanding, so much so that we have the biggest student leader group the school has ever had with 36 students on the team! Students made it extremely hard for us in the group interviews for the core team as well. We could see how much talent we were working with so we created extra roles within the core team. A great time was had by all, and it was lovely to spend time with our students and their parents. We look forward to seeing our students get to work on their action plans and drive positive changes at Hungerhill.

## Reading Success at Atmogeifile

As a school, we know reading is crucial to develop students as independent and resilient learners. Being an able reader improves the life chances of all Hungerhill students.

Students in Year 7 and 8 have worked extremely hard during lessons and extra reading interventions and have recently carried out reading tests to see how much their reading has improved since September. All their hard work has paid off and they have achieved some excellent results.

## Year 7

- $91 \%$ of students are reading at or above age-related expectations.
- As a whole year group, the students are performing significantly above the national average.
- On average, students in the Accelerate classes have made more than twice the progress compared to their peers nationally over a period of 12 months.


## Year 8

- $91 \%$ of students are reading at or above age-related expectations.
- 85 students demonstrate a reading age above age related expectations. This has more than doubled from 41 at the start of the year.
- Students whose baseline reading results were below age-related expectations have made 36 months progress in only 12 months, having made more progress than the national average.
- Students with special educational needs have made progress at the same rate as their peers.
- On average, students in the Accelerate classes have made 29 months progress in 12 months.

Some Year 7 and 8 students have been taken part in intensive small group reading support. Students are using phonics, supported by reciprocal reading to decode text at both word and sentence level. They have produced written work showing that they can move from writing simple sentences to more complex sentences using connectives.

They clarify vocabulary, predict events, analyse and question the text and summarise their findings This is compounded by an excellent library, full stocked with the latest books, manned by our excellent Librarian, Miss K and a dedicated lesson each week where students choose books and read for pleasure. In addition, a Reciprocal Reading lesson dips into a plethora of fiction and non-fiction texts, enabling students to work collaboratively to explore and investigate the written word. Our students delve into reading and discover whole new adventures and facts to enrich their lives.
