Careers Drop-in - Years 9-10

At Hungerhill School we are committed to ensure that our students are prepared for the world of work and receive impartial and comprehensive advice to help give them an informed understanding of the range of pathways and choices available to them. With this in mind, we have introduced a weekly careers drop-in service for students from year groups 9-10. One lunchtime a week our independent careers advisor, John Jackson will be available in student reception for students to drop-in and chat about anything careers related.

In Year 11 all students receive a one-to-one personal guidance appointment with Mr Jackson and Year 10 students can request an appointment via Mrs Gratton, Careers Lead.



Reading Buddies

The Year 7 readers have now been reading with the Year 9 buddies for nearly a term and we are beginning to see some real progress. The scheme allows students who need further support with their reading to access two morning reading sessions where they are paired with a Year 9 student, who is trained in how to improve their reading skills. The enthusiasm of the students this year has been wonderful: Year 7 have arrived, without fail, ready to read and eager to chat to their buddy. They were keen to express the many ways they were feeling better about reading and also, socialising with others around school.

Houses of Parliament

and London Visit

The trip visited the Houses of Parliament for a behind the scenes tour including watching debates in both the House of Lords and House of Commons. Following the tour, a debating workshop was undertaken with both groups being visited by Dame Rosie Winterton MP (Deputy Speaker & Doncaster MP). During her visit students debated with her about reforms to the House of Lords and the biased representation of MPs from elite public schools.



Following the Houses of Parliament visit students went for an evening meal at Pizza Express in the West End before heading to a performance of Mary Poppins the Musical. We were lucky enough to have seats in the stalls with a fantastic view of the stage, the show was excellent and enjoyed by all (especially English and Drama Teacher Miss Holland). After the show we checked into our hotel to get some much needed rest.

On Tuesday after breakfast, our coach dropped the group at Hyde Park for a good walk exploring the park, the Albert Memorial and the Royal Albert Hall before proceeding to the Natural History Museum. Students explored the museum in great detail and many were surprised on the sheer scale of the dinosaur skeletons.

Students thoroughly enjoyed the trip with many students who have never visited London or seen a West End Show. A huge thank you to staff who kindly gave up their time to support the trip, Mrs Scarth, Miss Holland, Mrs Clayton and Mrs Wilson were all fantastic and I could have not run the trip without them. Partnership Trust Spelling Bee

Brighter Futures Learning Partnership Trust Spelling Bee held at Hungerhill School for the first time. On Tuesday, 29 November, every primary school in the Brighter Futures Learning Partnership Trust attended Hungerhill for the grand final of the Spelling Bee. These included Barnby Dun Primary Academy, Kirk Sandall Infants and Junior School, West Road Primary Academy and Dunsville Primary School. A selection of our Year 7 students were fantastic ambassadors for the school and their support on the night was greatly appreciated!

Every year group from Year 2 to Year 6 took part and all four schools involved arrived with their top two spellers. The competition was intense with each school taking part in two rounds: Round 1, Fast Five, involved spelling 5 very challenging words on a whiteboard in pairs with a point for each correct word. This was followed by a speed round with individual students spelling as may words as possible in 30 seconds. It was unbelievable how well the students did, and staff and parents alike were amazed by the complexity of words and the speed at which the students were able to recall them. The final few minutes were tense with a sudden death round for Year 6 which saw Dunsville Primary school take the trophy. Our congratulations also go to Barnby Dun Primary and Kirk Sandall Juniors, who both won two trophies each, but as one very knowledgeable participant said, 'it wasn't the winning that was important, it was trying your best,' and all the students involved demonstrated how resilient and committed they were to doing just that!

Well done to all involved. We shall look forward to another competition next year.
