


#### Year 7 – Tuesday 10 January

The focus was tolerance and discrimination and students fed back that they particularly enjoyed the word shower and advert tasks.



#### Year 8 - Wednesday 11 January

Students looked at many aspects of the Islam faith, including the Quran, the life of Muhammed and the five pillars of Islam.





#### Year 9 - Wednesday 18 January

Students learnt in more depth about radicalisation and extremism. This included classroom sessions and a drama workshop led by 'Odd Arts'. Many students contributed well to discussions with the Odd Arts facilitator. Some students even got up and took part in improvised scenes with the professional actors!



The overall focus was human rights but specifically, students looked at the death penalty, the rights of prisoners and laws around the use of weapons.
