

Gulliver's Kingdom

Visit

Year 8 students and Year 9 students visited Gulliver's Kingdom for a STEAM event where they had talks on careers in STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and maths) from employers in the region and participated in workshops making things such as wind turbines and model F1 cars.





We are pleased to share the successful completion of our first cohort of students taking part in the Scholars Programme ran by the Brilliant Club. 8 Students from across Year 9 and Year 10 have completed the programme with an assignment on 'The Meaning of Life'. The programme consisted of 7 seminars ran by a PHD student Charlie Potter from the University of Sheffield. Over the seminars, students discussed and researched elements around the meaning of life before completing a final assignment which was graded using University style grades. The average grade awarded was a 2:1 with one student achieving a 1st. Charlie commented how some of the essays were at the standard or higher than some first-year students. As the programme launched, students visited Nottingham University for a tour and to explore University campus life. Once the programme had been completed and work graded, students attended their graduation event at the University of Sheffield with a tour and work with Student Ambassadors to develop understanding of courses and types of universities. For the final part of the celebration, students attended a Headteachers Lunch with Mrs Pond which allowed all to discuss the programme, share their experiences and future aspirations for university. It was a brilliant experience for all involved and as Lead of the programme it was wonderful to see the development in the students.



On 21 and 22 February, our Year 11 and Year 10 students attended a visit to CAST Theatre for a performance of Macbeth. As Macbeth is one of their set GCSE texts, the students were thrilled to have the chance to see it live in production! From the chaotic violence to the subtle manipulation of Lady Macbeth, from the treacherous killing of the king to the untimely demise of Macbeth: the action was non-stop. The students in attendance were mesmerised by the modern interpretation of



Shakespeare's classic and it was fantastic to see their expressions of acknowledgment when a key quote – particularly Macduff's "Turn, hellhound" - was delivered so flawlessly by the actors. This was an amazing opportunity for our Year 11 students to be able to see their interpretation of the tragic play brought to life – especially with their final exams just around the corner. It's not often that you get to mix the finest works of William Shakespeare with cut-throat modern violence, but the blend was seamless, and the students were gripped; a 5-star review all round!

Study Skills

Introduced in January 2022, the Hungerhill Study Skills programme aims to improve students' knowledge and understanding of revision/retrieval practice. Our vision remains for all students to be familiar with each of the five revision strategies (mind maps, knowledge organisers, flash cards, retrieval clocks and flow charts) and be able to utilise them to aid their learning.

This year, Year 7 students have been introduced to the programme for the first time and Year 8-11 students have had a refresher session on Study Skills on the first day of term. All students have received a new copy of the booklet which we encourage them to keep in their bag at all times. In January 2023, students had assemblies and completed form time activities to focus on using the revision organiser in the study skills booklet in the run up to the Spring Term High Stakes assessments. Anti-Bullying

Year 11 Student Leaders:
